The Complainant alleged a superior court judge was biased and improperly kept the children from their father in a family law case.

The role of the Commission on Judicial Conduct is to impartially determine whether a judicial officer has engaged in conduct that violates the Arizona Code of Judicial Conduct or Article 6.1 of the Arizona Constitution. There must be clear and convincing evidence of such a violation in order for the Commission to take disciplinary action against a judicial officer.

The Commission does not have jurisdiction to overturn, amend, or remand a judicial officer's legal rulings. The Commission reviewed all relevant available information and concluded there was not clear and convincing evidence of ethical misconduct in this matter. The complaint is therefore dismissed pursuant to Commission Rules 16(a) and 23(a).

Commission member Delia R. Neal did not participate in the consideration of this matter.

- Per her ruling on , a 50/50 custody split was issued - The children were removed from father via an OOP on - The OOP was Dismissed on - Judge has no standing to continue to allow the Mother to keep children from Father. To do so is a violation of Due Process. Even on a temporary basis for "the best interest of the children" is in disagreement with Quilloin v. Walcott, 434 U.S. 246 (1978). - Judge has chosen to ignore the fact that Mother is in direct and continued violation of her decision on and has chosen not to find the Mother in contempt of court for doing so. - Judge decided to delay hearing of further contempt of court allegations of the Mother, further delaying justice in the matter - Mother has made several false accusations against Father and all have been found unsubstantiated. However no judgement has been made in regards to violating A.R.S 13-2702 or 13-2907. - The fact that a family court judge is allowed to ignore perjury and false reporting of crimes is reprehensible. - Despite all of the reports being unsubstantiated, and all the police reports being closed due to lack of evidence. Judge took it upon herself to rule on these anyways and unjustly awarded mother 80% parenting time in her ruling on She cited the reports as a reason why. - Judge routinely mentions the fact that corporal punishment has been used despite any evidence being presented. It is simply testimony of the mother. She is using hearsay to take away parenting rights. Even if it were true, it is protected under ARS statues. Without being convicted of any crime let alone charged or under investigation, Judge again has taken upon herself to issue judgment - Judge needs to recuse herself from this case. She is very clearly unable to remain unbiased. Her misinterpretation of the law and unconstitutional rulings are appalling Her judgments assume her police, attorney general, lawyer, and jury. She ignores due process and abuses the preponderance of the evidence standard, which is already a lowly standard. She is unfit to be a judge on the family court bench.	

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
